Dear Friends in St John Singapore,

As we come to the end of 2021, I reflect on the many challenges we had to face over the past 12 months, and I heave a sigh of great relief. The organization has cleared several hurdles and surpassed the expectations of many during this period. This has clearly been possible with Blessings from God, as well as good teamwork on the ground.

One of the biggest hurdles we crossed was in the middle of the year, when we submitted our application for renewal of the IPC status. Prior to the application, we did a lot of groundwork to improve our processes, governance and compliance. We also did training for Volunteers (such as briefings and dialogue sessions). Staff were sent on training. After many exchanges of correspondence with our Sector Administrator, our answers to rigorous questions passed the tests, and our IPC status was renewed for 3 years (till 30th June 2024). We are also glad to report that we passed accreditation exercises for the following:

- Bizsafe Level 4 on 8 March 2021
- ISO 29993 Surveillance Audit on 29 Oct 2021
- SFA Recertification on End Dec 2021

Our Dementia Centre was inspected on 18th November 2021 and we continue to gradually increase our activities with the highest standards of safe management measures in place.

We have intentions to widen our outreach to the local communities, especially the seniors and to include the migrant workers.

In this final newsletter issue of 2021, we highlight several important events that have taken place throughout the year, including the Brigade Chief Commissioner's Change of Command Ceremony and the good work that our volunteers have been doing despite the COVID-19 pandemic.

BRIGADE CHIEF COMMISSIONER'S CHANGE OF COMMAND CEREMONY

On 13 March 2021, a Change of Command Ceremony was held at the National Headquarters in line with the COVID-19 Safe Management Measures, where Dr Nelson Chua, CStJ took over command of the St John Brigade from Professor Christopher Goh, CStJ.

Prof Christopher Goh completed his term of office on 12 November 2020. In his farewell address, Prof Goh paid tribute to the officers, members and cadets from all walks of life whom he had led over the past eight years. He cited three areas which made him proud as Chief Commissioner. Firstly, our cadets had ensured a high standard of First Aid and Home Nursing, winning the Lee Kong Chian Challenge Trophy during the Singapore-Malaysia First Aid Competition. Secondly, the precise, disciplined drills and smart turnout from our officers and cadets on parade won praise from our foreign guests during the Priory Inauguration, Grand Council Meeting and Brigade General Inspections. Thirdly, the Brigade had risen to the challenges brought on by COVID-19. First Aid training for our cadets was conducted via Home Based Learning, and this was subsequently extended to Home Nursing and implemented for the Officer and NCO courses. This helped to maintain a sense of normalcy in the lives of our volunteers and cadets, and continued to engage them virtually and innovatively. Prof Goh also recognized volunteers from the St John Response Unit, who partnered with our counterparts from St John Malaysia to support the transport of pregnant women back to Malaysia during their Movement Control Order.

Prof Goh paid tribute to the hard work put in by the Transformation Committee who came together over a few years to study how the Brigade could continue to remain relevant to serve the community through the various projects, continuing to train future generations of cadets in First Aid, and fly the Singapore flag high beyond our shores.

Prof Low Cheng Hock, KStJ, Advisor to the National St John Council then introduced the incoming Chief Commissioner, Dr Nelson Chua, CStJ, who had been with St John since 1992. He had served with distinction as a Senior Consultant Anaesthesiologist at Tan Tock Seng Hospital, and also the


Virtual Sharing Session for St John Fellowship Members

PUBLIC DUTIES IN THE TIME OF COVID-19

Public duties have been a space for volunteering and contribution, where St John members apply their first aid skills in service to the public. Many passionate and enthusiastic volunteers have leveraged on public duties as an opportunity for learning and bonding with like-minded individuals. Once a mainstay of St John Singapore (SJS), public duties have slowed with the dearth of events conducted with live audiences in Singapore. Across the year, we have provided medical, first aid and emergency ambulance services to only a few major events. This is in large part due to the rapidly escalating severity of community COVID-19 cases, leading to frequent cancellation, postponement and downsizing of events.

The St John Responder Unit (SJRU) is the operational arm of the St John Singapore in organizing and performing public duties. When SJRU started the planning cycle for first aid coverage of the National Day Parade (NDP), the nationwide vaccination exercise had just begun. In response to the Singapore Armed Force's call for volunteers to assist in the first aid coverage of NDP, many volunteers across the Brigade came forward, but were unable to, due to not having completed their vaccination regime. Furthermore, as the Delta wave continued to rise, volunteers who were able to participate in the NDP public duty also had to undergo preevent testing at the designated sites by the SAF as part of measures to ensure a safe event.

Following NDP 2021, lessons learnt from the NDP experience were applied to the Istana Open House, held during Deepavali. As Antigen Rapid Test (ART) kits were made more accessible to the public, SJRU continued this practice of self-testing by having our volunteers perform their own ART self-test at home before reporting for public duty. Self-testing allows our volunteers to practice first aid safely during public duty.

ADAPTATION TO NEW MEASURES

With new challenges, opportunities for innovation arise. Throughout the course of this pandemic year, there was a need to constantly reflect and innovate how SJRU can continue our service to humanity, without compromising on the safety and quality of care we deliver. Such rapid adaptation could not have been possible without the openmindedness of our volunteers, and their willingness to serve despite sudden changes and constant uncertainty. We evolve with the changing circumstances, to provide the best prehospital care possible. While Singapore is adapting to the new normal, so are we in ensuring public duties remain a safe space for our volunteers to contribute to the community.

SUPPORTING OUR MIGRANT WORKER COMMUNITY

Across six Sundays in August and September 2021, St John Brigade East District volunteers conducted virtual lessons to equip the migrant worker community with first aid and healthcare knowledge. This is the second year of partnership with ItsRainingRaincoats (IRR), an initiative that aims to improve the lives of migrant workers in Singapore.

Our volunteers taught the lessons in English, and they were translated to Bengali & Tamil with the help of translators. The first aid topics were chosen to be relatable to the potential hazards the migrant workers may face at their workplace. Beyond learning to recognize and treat basic wounds and bleedings, the migrant workers learnt about heat injuries and head and spinal injuries. Although done virtually, the volunteers included translated slides and interactive quizzes to keep our audience engaged. More than 50 migrant workers joined and benefited from each session.

Through these sessions, our volunteers also had the opportunity to interact and understand the challenges faced by migrant





ST JOHN VOLUNTEERS HELP RAISE AWARENESS ON FALL PREVENTION IN SENIORS

The St John Brigade's Northwest and North Districts successfully executed "Project Happy Feet", a campaign to raise awareness on fall prevention in the Chua Chu Kang estate, from January to April 2021. Specifically, the campaign focused on the various types of hazards that causes falls, as well as educating seniors in our community on the measures they can take to reduce the risk of falling. Officers from the two districts conducted monthly outreach sessions at the Chua Chu Kang Community Club. They engaged residents by sharing basic fall prevention tips, and teaching simple exercises for elderly residents to strengthen their muscles.

On 17 April 2021, the campaign culminated with door-to-door visits across six residential blocks in Chua Chu Kang. In partnership with the Chua Chu Kang Youth Network, and also joined by volunteers from Southwest District,

our officers reached out to more than five hundred households to educate on fall prevention, as well as to encourage residents to register for Covid-19 vaccination. The event was graced by Minister Gan Kim Yong, Member of Parliament for Chua Chu Kang GRC, who acknowledged the team's work and encouraged them to return to Chua Chu Kang to conduct future education on related health and safety topics.

In addition to receiving good feedback on the campaign from residents and stakeholders alike, our volunteers also found the experience enriching. "Although the project was originally organised as a requirement under our Officer Training Course, Project Happy Feet has allowed me to have a deeper understanding of the problems faced by residents in our community and has given me the opportunity to work with a team to help tackle these issues" shared Corps SO(6) Caleb Steven, one of the officers who took part in the project. Corps SO(6) Tan Ying Xin, 19, echoed his sentiments. "As a Nursing Student, I think community health is of vital importance to our elderly, so I was proud to have played
